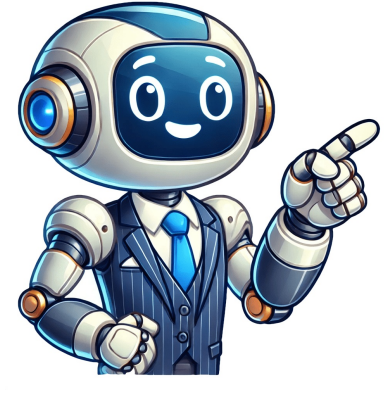

The Instruction Permit is the first phase of South Dakota's Graduated Driver's License (GDL) program for drivers under 18. This permit allows you to drive alone, but only from 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM (with some exceptions for school, work, or church events).
