Using your smartphone's front-facing camera, the app scans 64 points on your face to perfectly swipe on lipstick, blush, eye shadow, and liner. Because it all happens live, you can test out each look at different angles, which is, well, just genius. Available for iPhone (Free) Full disclosure: We teamed up with SkinBetter to create this one—but we think you'll be just as impressed with the high-tech skin-analysis tool as we were. Just snap a photo of yourself, create a skin profile, and let the app do its thing: It uses dermatologist-grade scanning technology to identify your biggest skin issues (including wrinkles, redness, and dark spots), then serves up recommendations for products that will treat them. It all happens in seconds, and you can even purchase products right on the spot! Available for iPhone and Android. (Free) If you live in New York City, L.A., Houston, or Dallas, BeautyBooked is a good place to start your search for a salon or spa-and we're not just saying that because it features the Allure Directory reviews. You can browse by salon name or treatment, check out reviews (from us and other users), flip through salon and spa photos, and book a service—even for a particular stylist or technician—directly through the app. And if you don't live in New York City, L.A., Houston, or Dallas, stay tuned: More cities are coming soon!Available for iPhone(Free)Before your mind gets stuck in the gutter, this app determines how toxic your beauty products are—a pretty brilliant idea, since ingredient details aren't always easy to find. Scan a product's barcode or search the database by product name; the app ranks its ingredients from one to ten on a "Dirty Meter," as well as offering greener alternatives. The library isn't the most extensive, but you can submit nonreviewed products for consideration as you scan your way through your vanity. Available for iPhone(\$2.99)We know, Photoshopping an iPhone pic just so you can post it on Instagram is a bit much. But FaceTune offers an impressive suite of editing tools—no computer necessary. You can smooth complexions, make zits disappear, correct red eye, and brighten teeth so fast, it's hardly high-maintenance. Available for iPhone, Android, and Windows Phone(Free)According to an allure.com poll, 38 percent of women have too many products to count in their makeup bag. Enter this app, which keeps track of not only your mascaras, lipsticks, and bronzers, but all of your skin- and hair-care products, too. It stores info, like when you bought an item and how full it is, then anticipates when you're running low. It sends you a reminder to refill, and when it's time, you can purchase a replacement within the app through retailers including Soap.com, Sephora, Saks, and Walmart. And if that wasn't enough, the app pulls in coverage from more than 30 magazines and blogs—allure.com included—so you never have to miss a new product review.Available for iPhone(\$2.99) This app is the ticket for beauty addicts shopping on a budget, pairing splurge-worthy products with cheaper drugstore versions. It's not perfect (the search function is pretty barebones, so we prefer to scroll through the app's individual category lists), but it puts inexpensive product recommendations for hair, makeup, skin, nails, and tools all in one place. Unlike some try-it-on apps, this one doesn't just drop a lame overlay of a preconfigured hairstyle on top of your photo; it actually changes the hair color in the image that you import. It's easy, too: Just upload a selfie, trace your hairstyle with your finger (so the app knows where to apply your chosen shade), and pick from one of the 30 blonde, brown, and red hair-color options. Merry Christmas, lucky! Whether you're a first-time smartphone owner (say goodbye to your attention span) or a migrant to a new platform, a freshly opened phone is an exciting new frontier. With millions of apps available, this little gadget will undoubtedly become an indispensable part of your day-to-day life. But where to start? The first apps anyone crams onto a new phone are pretty obvious: what are the services, social networks and games you already use? Most people go straight for Facebook (and its various offshoots, like Instagram and WhatsApp), YouTube, Snapchat, Netflix, Pandora, and the like. But there are millions of developers around the world toiling away on inventive and useful mobile apps that aren't necessarily household names. Often, they creep up the top charts in the app stores, but not always. Here's a field guide to some of the less obvious, but still must-download apps for your shiny and deeply addictive new device. PeriscopeFacebook. Twitter. Instagram. Snapchat. Of course you're going to scurry through the app store and and nab the most popular social networking apps first. But once you've done that, go ahead and download Periscope. It may not be as much of as household name as Twitter, its parent company, but the live broadcasting video app is already having an impact. Periscope is used by over 10 million people to view live broadcasts of breaking news events or the microwaving of macaroni and cheese. Launched by Twitter in March 2015, Periscope has raised concerns about piracy and sparked debates about the ethics of live-streaming as tragedy unfolds. Most of the videos are much more mundane than that. But there's something fascinating about getting a little real-time window into somebody else's world, and then having that window shut after 24 hours (that's when Periscope videos disappear). Even if you're not ready to live-stream your Christmas dinner to the world, go ahead and download Periscope to see what kind of random, weird, potentially riveting stuff is happening around the world right now. Download Periscope here. It may have taken over a decade, but podcasts are officially all the rage. Thanks to the rise of Serial and other hits, the once-geeky mass medium is something you can chat about with the whole family during the holidays. But first, you need to spend the afternoon binge listening. There are a bunch of podcasting apps out there, including ones that come pre-installed on many devices. Stitcher has been around for a few years now, but it's still hard to beat. Its design encourages discovery and listening without the user getting lost in choices (or distracted from driving, for that matter). Playlists, offline listening, and a priceless "listen later" button make collecting and hearing your favorite podcasts easier than most other apps allow. Download Stitcher here.(Overcast is another widely recommended podcasting app, although unlike Stitcher, it's only available for iOS)NYT NowHere's a sentence I didn't envision saying when I bought my first smartphone in 2008: Man, the app this newspaper company built is really awesome. But alas, here I am-and I mean it. There are countless apps that let you read the news and other articles on your phone (I still jump between Flipboard, Feedly, Longform, and Instapaper on the regular), but NYT Now is special. It takes the venerable brand and journalism of the nation's "paper of record" and puts it in a well-designed, smartly curated, and easily digestible app that feels like it came from a stealthy startup. NYT Now is respectful of your time, offering bullet point summaries and reading time estimates beneath headlines. At the same time, it offers opportunities to delve into longform articles and read select pieces from other publishers, curated by the app's editorial team. Somehow, NYT Now scratches both the itch to skim the news on the subway and dive deep on the sofa. Download NYT Now here. Afterlight, Dark Sky, and Periscope (iOS only) Despite being introduced nearly 30 years ago, the GIF (particularly the animated variety) is just now becoming a mainstay of modern communication. GIFs fill Tumblr, illustrate major news events on Twitter, and enhance our one-on-one communication via chat or IM. The team at Giphy is obviously well aware of just how indispensable these little animations have become in online life. That's why the newest version of their Giphy Cam app makes it even easier to create, edit, and share GIFs. The app lets you select from a range of effects filters and superimposed graphics and text. Unlike the previous version of Giphy Cam, this one lets you grab images and videos from your phone's camera roll, so you can make GIFs out of just about anything. More than just a holiday time waster, Giphy Cam will help you delight and entertain your friends and loved ones. Download Giphy CamWorkflow (iOS only)One of the best apps to land on iOS this year is Workflow, a tool for automating tasks between the various apps on your phone. If you're familiar with IFTT (whose app, unlike Workflow, is available for Android too), you get the idea: You can define a series of actions in a simple, drag-and-drop interface and enable different services to talk to each other and unlock new possibilities. Popular workflows include the ability to automatically pull up Google Maps directions for the next event on your calendar, tweet the song you're listening to (or instantly find the lyrics online), or turn Live Photos and videos into GIFs. Workflow doesn't have guite as many options as IFTT (or "recipes" as that service calls them), but its interface is foolproof and its tight integration with iOS is a big plus. Download Workflow here.Dark Sky (iOS only)The weather on the East Coast has been freakishly warm and rainy this holiday season. In fact, another drizzle is about to start in a few minutes. How do I know? I found out the same way I find out about missed calls, Slack mentions, Tinder matches, and horrifying current events: I got a push notification. Thanks to Dark Sky, the innovative weather app, I can get real-time notifications about changes in the conditions outside. Dark Sky takes the standard day-by-day (and hour-by-hour) weather forecasts up a notch with sleek, minimal elegance, subtle animations, and maps showing precipitation and temperatures shift around the globe.But what makes Dark Sky the best weather app I've ever used is its timeliness. In addition to what the day (and subsequent days) are going to look like outside, Dark Sky spells out for users what is going to happen in the next several minutes. Download Dark Sky here. AfterlightYour new smartphone can have the most advanced camera specs out there, but that doesn't mean your photos will all magically turn out looking frame-worthy. Even the best shots could benefit from a quick tune-up before you Instagram them. Afterlight is one of countless photo-editing apps available for Android and iOS, but having taken many of them for a spin, I find I keep returning to this one (VSCO Cam is a close second). Afterlight offers all of the standard photo-editing options (adjusting clarity, saturation, contrast, brightness, shadows and the like), but packs them into a pleasant, intuitive interface and layers on Instagramstyle filters and retro effects that recall the light leaks and artsy discoloration of film photography. You can also crop, add borders, and layer on other images to mimic multiple exposure photos. Download Afterlight here. P.S. — Don't forget to download Fast Company's app, too! Install an app from Google Play and, while the installer takes the form of an APK files, you're never given the opportunity to download the file directly. Using the APK Downloader extension for Chrome, you can download any APK you need so you have it as a backup. This does not mean that you can wade into the store and start downloading all of the premium apps and games you've always had your eye on. This is not a tool for piracy, but it will enable you to download the APK for any free apps. Note: Using APK Downloader is against Google's Terms of Service as it involves accessing Google Play using means 'other than through the interface that is provided by Google'. You can download a copy of the extension by paying a visit to Code Kiem. You will need to right click the link to the latest version of the extension and select Save Target As. To install APK Downloader, click the menu button to the upper right of Chrome and select Settings, click Extensions and then drag the .crx file you have downloaded onto the extensions page - make sure you drag to the center of the page so the 'Drop to install' drop zone appears. Click Add and a new icon will appear to the far right of the address bar. Click the Options link beneath the APK Downloader entry on the Extensions page and you will be asked to provide your email, password and device ID. Enter the email address and password associated with your Google Play account. The extension's page provides details for why this information is needed. When it comes to your Android Device ID, there are a couple of options available to you. If you're using a phone, bring up your dialer and call *#*#8255#*#*. Scroll down through the data that is shown and beneath the JID entry which lists your email address, you'll find your Device ID in hexadecimal format. We're interested in the 16 characters that appear after 'android-' If you have a tablet – although you can also do this with a phone – you should download Device ID from Google Play. This provides you with the same information. Enter all of these details into the Options page for APK Downloader and click Login. Now you can head over to Google Play and start browsing through the available titles. When you find something you would like to download, open up its page and click the APK Downloader icon at the right hand side of the address bar and save the APK as you would any other download. If you have trouble downloading APKs, go back and double check that your Device ID has been entered correctly – get it wrong and you'll see nothing but download errors.
