For students to be considered as "residence," they must be enrolled in courses on the Berkeley campus (excluding UC Extension) and registered in the College of Letters and Science. Most students fulfill this requirement automatically, unless they go abroad or take courses at another institution during their senior year. In these cases, students should meet with a college adviser to determine how to meet the senior residence requirement. Senior Residence Requirement: - After becoming a senior (90 semester units), students must complete: * At least 24 units in residence as an L&S student * At least 2 semesters in residence as an L&S student * To count as a semester, at least 6 units must be passed Modified Senior Residence Requirement: - Students participating in certain programs (UCEAP, Berkeley Summer Abroad) may meet this requirement by completing 24 of their final 60 semester units in residence. Upper Division Residence Requirement: - L&S students must complete a minimum of 18 upper division courses in residence, with at least 12 in their major program. U.S. Military Students: - Those in active military service may be eligible for senior residence exceptions. Intercampus Visitor Program and other non-resident units do not count towards senior residence requirements. For the seven-course breadth in L&S, it's essential to understand how to get community college courses approved and which classes fulfill the requirements for studying abroad or through UCEAP programs. Abroad, participation in the program is a good way to meet the international studies requirement, along with the other six requirements. However, students should still pass all the necessary requirements and check which courses are equivalent based on their location and program. UCEAP's affiliation with the University of California makes it easier for students to choose an equivalent breadth class. Nonetheless, if a course fulfills more than one breadth, students can only take it once. There is also flexibility in taking no more than two breadth courses from the same department, but major requirements and prerequisites can simultaneously fulfill breadth requirements. Some recommended classes for each breadth include: Arts and Literature - Theater 26: Introduction to Performance Studies English - English 45A/45B/45C: Literature in English Science - ESPM 40: Insects and Human Society PhysEd - PhysEd 32: Fitness for Life - Physical Adaptations to Exercise Looking forward to taking classes like Psychology C61 - Brain, Mind and Behavior which explores contemporary neuroscience and the complexities of the brain. Additionally, considering enrolling in History 7B - Introduction to the History of the United States: The United States from Civil War to Present, as it's a prerequisite for Media Studies majors and features an excellent lecturer with engaging lesson outlines and thought-provoking discussions on American history. The semester has finally started, and Professor Keltner's class on happiness is one of the most anticipated ones. It delves into the evolution of understanding happiness over time, along with the historical treatments aimed at making people happy. Meanwhile, for those interested in mythology, AGRS 28 - Greek and Roman Myths offers an insightful look into these ancient stories and their relevance in contemporary society. For non-science majors, EPS 80 - Environmental Earth Sciences is a great choice, providing a math-free exploration of the earth's natural and man-made processes that impact the environment. Its reasonable workload and knowledgeable professor make it an excellent option. On the other hand, ASTRON C10 - Introduction to General Astronomy is highly recommended for STEM majors, offering fascinating field studies and open spots even after the initial days of the semester. However, its math-heavy content may not be suitable for non-STEM students. For those interested in social sciences, MEDIAST 10 - Introduction to Media Studies is an excellent choice, focusing on media literacy and providing a fun learning experience with its engaging professor. Additionally, Anthropology 160AC - Forms of Folklore offers a unique blend of traditional and modern folklore, making it an entertaining class with fascinating content. Ultimately, the most important thing is to choose courses that genuinely interest you! With up to a hundred classes available for some breadth requirements, be sure to explore the course catalog and find the perfect fit for your academic journey. The College of Letters and Science at UC Berkeley offers a liberal arts program with a Seven-Course Breadth requirement as its foundation. This requirement must be fulfilled with college coursework, excluding AP exams and high school work. Students can select from various breadth categories, such as Arts and Literature, Biological Science, Historical Studies, and more. Breadth courses must be at least three semester units or four quarter units and are subject to change based on unforeseen circumstances. Haas School students are required to complete the 7-course breadth sequence to earn a B.S. degree. Haas students should follow specific guidelines for breadth coursework, including avoiding Business, Reading and Composition, Microeconomics, and Macroeconomics courses. They can take up to two courses from any one department per semester, but no more than six courses total. Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate exams do not meet the breadth requirement. Students can find approved course options for breadth on the Berkeley Academic Guide Class Schedule website. To fulfill the requirement, students must complete one approved course in each of seven areas with a minimum grade of C- or P. Degree requirements for Haas School of Business at UC Berkeley are quite specific: students must complete courses in seven distribution areas to fulfill breadth requirements. These areas include Arts and Literature, Biological Science, Historical Studies, International Studies, Philosophy and Values, Physical Science, and Social and Behavioral Sciences. Pre-requisites for breadth requirements exclude business courses, micro and macro economics cannot be used to fulfill the requirements, nor can Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate credit. However, A Level exams are accepted, but students must consult with a Haas Advisor to determine how their credits can be applied. All courses taken by California community college students must follow the Articulation Agreement between their school and UC Berkeley for business administration major. This information is available on www.assist.org website. The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) does not satisfy Haas School of Business requirements. Students with college work from other schools, excluding California Community Colleges, can fulfill breadth requirements by taking UC-transferable courses that fit the breadth guidelines. Most academic courses are UC-transferable if comparable to courses offered at UC. Full participation in a study abroad program can meet one's academic requirements. Students can explore their intellectual and ethical motivations through various studies, including those focusing on religion, ethics, legal values, or philosophical figures. A strong understanding of physical science is also essential for success at UC Berkeley. Courses that satisfy this requirement teach students to explain natural phenomena using reason, experiment, and quantitative analysis. In addition to these core requirements, students must complete seven courses in various subjects, including development studies, economics, history, and sociology. Some A-level exams may be accepted as part of the breadth requirement, but high school exam scores are not sufficient. To fulfill this requirement, students can use online resources such as the Berkeley Academic Guide Class Schedule to find course options that fit their needs. When selecting a course, it's essential to note that while some courses may satisfy multiple breadth areas, they can only be used for one specific area. UC Berkeley International Studies students can satisfy their breadth requirements by participating in various study abroad programs sponsored by UC and UC Berkeley. These programs include the UC-Berkeley Study Abroad program, UCEAP programs, and other accredited college programs such as Budapest Semesters in Mathematics or CEA Study Abroad. To qualify for international studies breadth, students must complete all required courses with a grade of C- or better. For non-UC sponsored programs, students must obtain pre-approval from a College Adviser and provide the link to the program being considered. Simply taking coursework abroad does not meet the criteria. Additionally, transfer courses from accredited institutions must be completed with a grade of C- or better. Students who have UC IGETC Certification or UC Reciprocity Seven-Course Breadth are exempt from additional coursework requirements. California Community College Berkeley students can also pursue pre-approved courses for Seven-Course Breadth through the University.

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
