Over the past decade, the percentage of public high school graduates who took at least one AP Exam rose from 32.8% in the class of 2014 to 35.7% in the class of 2024. In 2024, 22.6% of the graduating class scored a 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam during high school—up from 19.9% in 2014, according to the College Board. Certain subjects saw notable improvements. The AP US History exam experienced a dramatic jump in pass rates, with 72% of students scoring a 3 or higher in 2024.
