The LPN Program at Rogue Community College The program at Rogue Community College focuses on developing a growth mindset while instilling the values of innovation, collaboration, and teamwork among students in the field of healthcare. The 9-month practical nursing program prepares students to work as entry-level practical nurses under the supervision of doctors or registered medical practitioners. Students will receive hands-on experience through clinical sessions, exposure to various nursing courses, lab practicals, and simulation room exercises. They will also gain valuable experience handling patients in real-life scenarios under expert supervision. In Portland, colleges like Portland Community College (PCC), Concorde Career College, and Sumner College offer LPN programs with varying costs and curricula. After completing your program, you can pursue employment opportunities at facilities such as OHSU Hospital, Legacy Good Samaritan Medical Center, and Providence St. Vincent Medical Center. To become a licensed practical nurse in Oregon, you'll need to pass the NCLEX-PN exam and meet the Oregon State Board of Nursing's requirements. You can get financial aid like federal loans, grants, or scholarships. Check with each school's financial aid office for specific opportunities. Licensure Reciprocity If you are a licensed LPN from another state, Oregon has licensure reciprocity policies. You need to provide proof of your license and meet additional requirements. Which Portland schools offer LPN programs? LPN programs are offered at various institutions like vocational schools, technical schools, and online universities. Find a program that prepares you for success as a nurse. How do I become an LPN in Oregon? You need to complete a practical nursing program and pass the NCLEX-PN exam to get certified and receive your required licensure. How long will my LPN Course be? LPN programs usually take 12 months to 18 months to complete. Some schools offer shorter programs that qualify you for certification after 6-10 months. Do I need to complete an LPN program before getting a RN degree? No, completing an LPN program is not necessary before getting an RN degree. An accredited RN degree can be completed in as little as two years. Typical LPN Pre-Reqs Most schools require applicants to have a high school diploma or GED and meet additional academic requirements. Check with the admissions office for specific requirements. Are CNA to LPN Programs Available? Yes, some vocational schools offer CNA to LPN programs that last one year. It's relatively straightforward to become an LPN in Portland, OR by completing a state-approved education program and passing the NCLEX-PN exam. The course can be completed in around one year if attending school full-time.
