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NEW LINE CINEMA Carrie Ann Inaba has showcased dance, martial arts, singing, editing and directing skills throughout her varied career. By Jason Genegabus jason@starbulletin.com AFTER more than a decade in the entertainment industry, Carrie Ann Inaba understands the importance of being happy with her work. When the former Hawaii resident learned of a chance to play one of the Fook twins in "Austin Powers in Goldmember," she jumped at the opportunity. "It was a dream. ... I've never had that much fun in my life," said Inaba from her home in Southern California last week. "I had taken time off to go back to school and do some documentaries and learn about directing and do choreography. Diane actually got the role first." Diane Mizota, who plays Inaba's twin sister Fook Mi in "Goldmember," had learned the directors needed someone to play Fook Yu. "They couldn't find the right girl, so they asked her if she knew somebody who looked like her," Inaba said. "Diane called and told me there was a little bit of martial arts involved, and I said I'd do it in a heartbeat." That phone call led to Inaba's second appearance in the Austin Powers 2: The Spy Who Shagged Me." The two roles are the latest in a respectable list of accomplishments since Inaba graduated from Punahou and moved out of her family's Niu Valley home. Following a brief recording career in Japan, Inaba made her way into America's living rooms on a weekly basis in 1989 as a Fly Girl on the television show "In Living Color." For three seasons she was able to fulfill the dream of performing on television for a living. "That was one of the best jobs that I could ever have," Inaba said. "A variety show, first of all, is really fun. You're surrounded by amazing comedians and you'll never know what is going to happen every week. But what I think I liked the most was hanging out with the Fly Girls. I found myself really getting along with (them) and I felt like it was the first time I belonged somewhere." Inaba's role as the only Asian American among the show's dancers was relatively new for television at the time, making her a role model of sorts for those watching at home. "I like the fact that we were all from different cultural backgrounds; it made for a really interesting group. That was a great time in my life." WHEN Inaba left "In Living Color" in 1992, she continued to dance professionally, although it "was kind of hard" moving on from such a successful program. She returned to the stress of auditioning while taking classes in Southern California and managing her instructor's business affairs while he was out of town. Inaba was also responsible for sending out examples of her instructor's choreography, which often featured her as one of the dancers. After sending a copy of the tape to Madonna's management for 1993's "The Girlie Show" tour, Inaba got a phone call with bittersweet news. The Material Girl didn't want her instructor as a choreographer for the tour, but she did want Inaba as a dancer. "It was a really hard choice ... but I turned her down," Inaba said, explaining that dropping everything and flying to New York for rehearsals "felt like it wasn't the right thing to do" while acting on behalf of her teacher. A week later, she got a rare second chance when Madonna's management flew to California for another round of auditions. Inaba was hired for "The Girlie Show" and is credited with choreographing one of the show's most erotic pole performances. The tour required her to shave her head and perform topless, two things Inaba had never thought of doing before joining Madonna on stage. "How many times do you get to say you shaved your head bald and came down a 50-foot pole in public?" asked Inaba with a laugh. "Madonna's whole idea was for everybody to be androgynous, and I thought that was a really wonderful idea. I didn't really have an issue with being topless; I thought it was kind of interesting. "I'm actually very conservative. That was another reason why I wanted to do it -- if you're going to do something, you should go for it." When Inaba left "The Girlie Show," she began to discover her love for being not only in front of the camera, but behind the scenes, as well. She landed roles in movies such as 1995's "Showgirls" and "Monster Mash: The Movie," but was also busy working as a choreographer in both Hollywood and Japan. OBSERVING the success of Hawaii-born entertainers like Kelly Hu, Tia Carrere and Jason Scott Lee, Inaba is still trying to figure out if she really wants the attention that comes with being a celebrity -- a very difficult decision, she insists. "I've been trying to find the balance between being behind the scenes and being in front of the camera," Inaba said. "I'm an entertainer. ... That's just my nature, (but) I don't know about being a celebrity. "I'm more interested in directing for television, short films, commercials or music is a way to tell a story kind of put me in a different kind of mindset from the beginning." The past few years have seen Inaba continue to develop as a choreographer. She has worked on Fox television line-up promos and the show "Who Wants to Marry a Multi-Millionaire," along with choreographing the last three years of the Miss America Pageant. Inaba also completed an independent digital short film, "Black Water." Scheduled for release around December, "Black Water" will mark Inaba's return to music with her appearance on the film's soundtrack. "I did find recently that I missed performing," Inaba said. "Now that I edit and direct, I'm behind a computer screen much more than I ever intended. I was missing touching people and making a difference in people's lives. "I like showing people that not everything is as you think it is, so don't be so quick to judge. I like breaking down those boundaries," she said. Inaba also plans to return to the islands a few times over the six months or so. Following a May engagement to actor John La Russo, Inaba is planning a small ceremony on a beach here sometime next year. At this point in her life, Inaba still has a number of career options available. While saying she'd "love to come back to Hawaii," Inaba is busy trying to get her digital video production company off the ground so that "in five years when I have kids, I'll have something where I don't have to go out and be in front of a camera all the time." And don't count out seeing the former Fly Girl onscreen again either. "I think that in life you're supposed to utilize what you should get out there and use (your talent) to the fullest." Who knows, maybe there's a Fook Twins spinoff movie in the works somewhere. In the mid-80s, she entered the entertainment industry as a singer and briefly worked in Japan. Carrie first gained major exposure in the early-90s when she returned to America and began performing as a professional dancer. Due to her huge accomplishments in the field of dancing, she was selected as a judge on the popular American dance competition TV show 'Dancing with the Stars'. A position she has continued to hold since the show premiered in 2005. Alongside dancing herself, she is an accomplished choreographer too, having choreographed for shows like American Idol, American Juniors, and Miss America Pageant. In more recent years, Inaba has moved towards hosting as well and has received widespread appreciation for her work in the field. Now as far as her personal life is concerned, Carrie Ann Inaba hasn't gotten married so far but over the years has remained in several romantic relationships. She has even gotten engaged twice, first with dancer Artem Chigvintsev and then with actor Robb Derringer. But unfortunately, both engagements were called-off shortly-after. She is best known for her work on ABC's Daytime talk show The Talk from 2019 to 2021. She started her career as a singer in Japan, but became best known for her dancing, introducing herself to American audiences as one of the original Fly Girls on the Fox sketch comedy series In Living Color from 1990 to 1992. Inaba was born and raised in Honolulu, Hawaii, [2] graduating from Punahou School in 1986.[3] She is of Irish, Japanese, and Chinese descent.[4][5] Her first dance instruction was at three years old in a "creative movement" class, where children danced on their own with scarves.[6] As a child, she would dance in her backyard that overlooked the Pacific Ocean.[5] She attended Sophia University of California, Irvine before graduating from the University of California, Los Angeles with a B.A. degree in world arts and cultures.[7] In 1986, an 18-year-old Inaba won a talent show in Hawaii.[4] She was then groomed to be a pop star in Japan and given songs to read phonetically in Japanese from a lyric sheet.[4] Even though her first single made the Top 50, she "realized it has nothing to do with how artistic you are. Your face becomes a logo they sell."[4] Inaba lived in Tokyo from 1986 to 1988 and was a popular singer.[6] She released three singles. "Party Girl" (backed with "China Blue"), "Be Your Girl" (backed with "G¹/₂ Capezio"), and "Yume no Senaka" (backed with "Searching") and hosted weekly radio and television series.[8] Five multicultural girls were going for their dreams and not afraid. The two women are not related, but when Mizota had been cast for her role, she was asked if she knew any actresses who resembled her and suggested Inaba. Inaba and Mizota reprised their roles with Mike Myers in a commercial for Motorola in 2005.[9] In later years, Inaba would later regret playing Fook Yu because of the negative stereotypes portrayed. Inaba has acted (usually as a dancer) in the movies Monster Mash: The Movie, Lord of Illusions, Showgirls, Boys and Girls, Flintstones II, Freak and American Virgin and the television series Jack & Jill and Nikki. Inaba has appeared on The View, [10] the ABC talent competition Dance War: Bruno vs. Carrie Ann, [11] and the Fox special Breaking the Magician's Code: Magic's Biggest Secrets Finally Revealed. She, along with Bruno Tonioli, has appeared in every season on Dancing with the Stars, [12][13] Inaba guest starred as Tina, Hannah's choreographer, in the Hannah Montana episode, "Papa's Got a Brand New Friend".[14] TV Guide Network announced that it had signed Inaba to anchor its live red carpet coverage, beginning with the 2009 Primetime Emmy Awards.[15] In October 2010, Inaba was named host of the revival of the game show 1 vs. 100 on GSN. After the first season, Inaba announced she would not return to host the show.[16] Inaba had been a recurring guest co-host for the CBS Daytime talk show, The Talk, for the last two seasons. She officially replaced original host Julie Chen as the fifth co-host and moderator permanently, officially debuting on January 2, 2019.[17] On April 26, 2021, Inaba announced she would take a leave of absence from the show.[18] On August 20, 2021, it was confirmed that Inaba would not be returning to the show for the upcoming season.[19] Inaba's choreography has appeared in several television series, including American Idol,[5] American Juniors, All American Girl, He's a Lady, In Search of the Partridge Family (in which she also appeared on air), Married by America, The Sexiest Bachelor in America Pageant, The Swan, and Who Wants to Marry a Multi-Millionaire?.[8][20] She also choreographed the Miss America Pageant, The Swan, and Who Wants to Marry a Multi-Millionaire?.[8][20] She also choreographed the Miss America Pageant for five years. She appeared in the first season of So You Think You Can Dance during the audition stages where she provided choreography for the "choreography round". Inaba served as an honorary judge at the 2009 USA Dance National Dance Sport Championships. [21] Inaba is the founder and President of EnterMediArts, Inc., a video production company. She directs, writes, and edits films. Her work includes E! Behind The Scenes Miss America Special, 7th Festival of the Pacific Arts, A Portrait of IVI and Beyond the Dancing Image, along with the short feature film Black Water. She was a producer for the Broadway show Burn the Floor at New York's Longacre Theatre. [22] In 2008, Inaba was awarded the Visionary Award by East West Players, the oldest Asian Pacific American theatre company in the United States, [23] for helping to raise "the visibility of the Asian American community through theater, film and television". [24] In 2006, she dated Russian dancer Artem Chigvintsev. [25] They met on the set of So You Think You Can Dance. [5] On the March 31, 2011, episode of Live with Regis and Kelly, Regis Philbin was "answering" a letter asking for advice on how to propose. The lights dimmed just before Inaba's boyfriend, Jesse Sloan, appeared on stage. With violinists playing in the background, Sloan, bent on online dating site eHarmony in 2009,[27] In an interview with Us Weekly in 2011, Inaba stated that she and Sloan would marry in the summer of that year.[28] In September 2012, a representative for Dancing with the Stars announced that she and actor Robb Derringer had become engaged after a few months of dating.
