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The perspective of Whitty Wapping / Tower Hamlets à é á è ç ä å ö ð æ œ ſ 57 Wapping Wall, London Louisa Cornell Whitby's perspective is one of the oldest London pubs and believes to be the oldest pub riverside on the Thames. There has been a pub on this site since 1520, which means that it existed during the reign of Henry VIII. In fact, the original Flagstone floor is still visible in the pub today. Four hundred years of age handicrafts. The four-year bar deck and pewter bar make Whitby's perspective one of London's most authentic historical pubs. The first pub on the site was called Pelican. Because of its proximity to the river, it quickly became a cov of cutthroats, pirates, thieves, roads, and many other unpleasant inhabitants à é á è ç ä å ö ð æ œ ſ of the area. Larger ships had that berthing in the middle of the river and goods were futured to coast on smaller boats by men called Iscermen. This made it easy for criminals to steal ships, and Pelican used to serve as a basis for these criminals to disperse their stolen goods. Until today, people are seeing man's face looking out the window where Jeffries used to sit. On an interesting side note, the Jeffries supposedly had the bodies of those hanged in the Bodies. Some scholars hid on boats along the river edge and they would throw down the bodies into the water. So, if you would want to see someone hanging from a gallows, go to Whitby's perspective to catch a glimpse of a body being thrown overboard. Unfortunately, after the French Revolution in 1698 his attorney Quod was sent sailing under a French pass. The captain, however, was an English and the rich position Kidd was owned by the East Indian company. Kidd was eventually captured and brought back to London, where he was sentenced to death for piracy and for the murder of one of his crew members (in 1697) who dared to cross him. It took three attempts to run Kidd captain. The first two ropes broke. The third realized and once he was dead in his body was dipped in Alcatraz and hanging by chains on the banks of the Thames as a warning for other pirates. After an inception at the beginning of the century XIX, the tavern was rebuilt and renamed. As the owners attempted everything to dissociate his tavern from his dangerous reputation, for a while they had removed all signaling. Those who wanted to direct someone to the tavern would say "you want the tavern of Whitty's perspective. Whitty's perspective was Collier hitting the tavern. They say that other similar ghosts are in search of Judge George Jeffries to take revenge. The ghost of a young woman dressed in a Doublet, shoes and smoking a pipe is often seen sitting in the dark corners of the pub watching the guests drink. Supposedly, she was a Cutpurse of Moll - a woman who slipped to dissavanciate (translation: Bed and in search of female company) men and cut his bags from his belts. It is believed that she was caught by one of her marks before she could run away and the gentleman beat her to death at the back of the tavern. A wonder if she is visiting the pub these days looking for her next mark. Oh, and remember that fire at the beginning of the XIX season? The cobbled streets of Whitechapel were lit up by bonfires for eight days straight. The coal burning in the chimneys was so hot that the houses started catching fire. One house caught fire and the flames spread to the others. At the time, no one knew what happened to stroll through the tavern after the closing time. However, people began to say that they saw lights from Whitty's perspective much after the owners closed and went to bed. Not just lights, but enough lights to see clear through the pub to the river. And in those lights saw a figure moving on the tavern. A version very similar to that of Captain William Kidd. Eventually, the owners decided that they did not want people to get to the pub after the closing of an attempt to see the mysterious figure. So, one night they decided to leave the lights in the tavern. Big mistake. That same night, an inception hatched on the back of the tavern and burned almost the execution dock. If not for the beginning bridge covered, the fire may have spread through the docks buildings. Needless to say, once the tavern was restored the lights were left out after the closure. Just in case. A vengeful captain Kidd should not be trituated. Today there is no need to imagine what the pub could have seemed when pirates, cutthroats and thieves occupied the tables there. From the fragile stairs to the stone floors, for the pastries and the heavy rum labors, Whitty's perspective seems very much as then. For a trip back in time for the days of Swashbuckling from once, this pub definitely worth a visit. Just pay attention to the silent chills and the hair in the back of your neck!
