What does orange light mean on dolce gusto machine

Many are the users who write us or leave comments frequently with doubts about the colour of the lights of their Dolce Gusto coffee maker. Apart from the classic general tips for Dolce Gusto coffee machines, there is a lot of interest in this particular topic. And be careful; even if this has never happened to you, it will also be right for you to get to know it if you are thinking of buying a Dolce Gusto coffee maker.Why does my Dolce Gusto light turn yellow instead of green? What do I do if my Dolce Gusto light turns red? What if my Dolce Gusto light flashes red? The questions are many, and the truth is that users get too distracted by this topic.This is one of the articles with the most comments and participation from readers in our entire community. And that doesn't happen by chance.As you know, the power button on your Dolce Gusto coffee maker is colour-coded to indicate different machine states, and these colours sometimes confuse users. But the truth is that these three colours (red, yellow and green) usually have a similar meaning on all occasions. You have to interpret whether the light in question is flashing or not.And of course, it's not all that easy because not all Dolce Gusto coffee makers include the colour yellow/orange (which is usually a warning of decalcification).Today we are going to shed some light on these and many other doubts, and we are going to see what each colour code means in the lights of the Dolce Gusto coffee machines.The power button has a green lightThe first thing you should consider is the Dolce Gusto coffee maker model you have at home. The newer models, such as the Oblo or Jovia, have a different and more complete colour code than the older Dolce Gusto coffee machines. All of them have the green colour code in common: if your Dolce Gusto coffee machine has the green button in a fixed position, it means that it is ready to use and there is no problem.Note: as long as the button lights up green in a fixed manner. If it flashes green, it is an anomaly and possibly related to the capacitors on the coffee maker's plate (translation: an electrical problem that causes no power to reach the coffee maker). In this case, it may be that the coffee maker either does not start or starts but is not able to heat the water.As we will see below, the colours red and orange offer more doubts. Let's take a look at them:My Dolce Gusto has an orange light!It is the case that most misleads users. If the light of your Dolce Gusto turns orange (or yellow) permanently, it means that you must decalcify the coffee machine. Follow the instructions of your Dolce Gusto regarding decalcification (see instruction manuals here), and when you have finished the process, turn it on again. The standard procedure is to press the button and hold it down for 5 seconds to enter decalcification mode.Once the process is completed, the power button will then start flashing green - Test passed!The orange decalcification light is a function that is incorporated into some of the latest Dolce Gusto models, such as the Lumio or the Colors.SaleNescafe Dolce Gusto Krups Lumio Automatic Coffee MachineAutomatic, ultra-compact capsule coffee machine 18 x 22 x 37 x cm (W x D x H) with a 1 L. water tankHigh-pressure coffee machine (up to 15 bars) for professional quality coffees with a thick velvety cremaOver 40 coffee creations and other delicious hot and cold beverages prepared with one easy push of a buttonDrink size adjustable with the automatic functionEco-mode: automatic switch-off after 1 minute; energy consumption rating A+For more information, visit the official Dolce Gusto website: decalcify your coffee machine with the orange flashing light.I have already decalcified, but the orange light is still on!Another problem that happens to a lot of people (as you can see in the comments too). We know that the yellow light on our Dolce Gusto coffee maker (or orange light, as we like it) means a decalcification warning. We disqualify the coffee maker, we do everything right, we turn it back on, and the damn light is still on! But what's going on here? Didn't decalcifying solve the problem?If the orange light is still on after decalcifying, it's because you didn't do the operation in "decalcifying mode". The operation is the same, and your decalcification was correct. The coffee machine is clean inside, the result is the same, but if you don't decalcify it inside the "decalcifying mode", the light will still be on because the coffee maker has no other way of knowing whether you've done the process or not.WORKAROUND: To remove this warning, as long as you are sure you have correctly decalcified the brewer, you must press and hold the power button for 30 seconds. The light will then turn green again.But next time remember to decalcify it within the decalcification mode!My Dolce Gusto has the red light flashing!Don't worry, if the button flashes red, there's probably no problem. Every time you turn on your Dolce Gusto coffee maker, you must wait a few seconds for the water to heat up before you can prepare the coffees. During this time, the coffee maker's power button flashes red to warn you not to use it.It is a temporary warning, which should only last a few seconds. When the heating process is complete, the button will change to permanent green, and then you can start using the brewer. If your Dolce Gusto brewer is manual (not automatic), remember that you cannot move the lever until the light turns green.The power button also flashes red for about 5 seconds each time you have finished brewing a cup of coffee. It means that you must not open the coffee machine or remove the capsule during this time. It is just a form of warning.If your Dolce Gusto coffee maker has a red light flashing and never turns green, then try cleaning the nozzle - the tube where the water comes out - with the cleaning needle that comes with every coffee maker. It's probably stuck.If the red button lights up permanently instead of flashing, then you need to worry a little more. Read on to find out why:My Dolce Gusto has a permanent red light!If the light on the power button is permanently red - and not flashing - the brewer is warning you that it has a fault or technical problem. The recommendation, in this case, is to turn off the brewer immediately and check if you have any blocked capsules inside or any similar incidence.Unplug the brewer completely (including from the mains) and plug it back in and switch it on again after about 30 minutes. If everything has gone well, the power button should start flashing green.If it continues to flash red, then the problem is more serious, and it is best to call Dolce Gusto customer service.IMPORTANT NOTE: Many of the causes of this permanent red light failure have to do with the power and the electrical board of the brewer. Automatic or capsule-based coffee machines, such as a Dolce Gusto machine, are very handy and practical for everyday use, whether at home or at work. One of their main advantages of this coffee machine is that they don't get dirty easily or need thorough daily cleaning. In addition, this method of making coffee is quicker than other methods such as instant coffee or a Moka pot.The one thing about Dolce Gusto machines is that they do require descaling. Are you wondering how to descale a Dolce Gusto machine? If so, follow these simple steps on how to descale a Nescafe Dolce Gusto machine: Descaling Dolce Gusto: option 1The first step on our simply Dolce Gusto coffee machine manual is to get rid of capsules. In order to descale a Dolce Gusto machine, you should first remove any coffee capsules, if left inside.Next,check the Dolce Gusto capsule dispenser to make sure it's empty. Once you've made sure it's empty, put it back.Next, fill the water tank in your Dolce Gusto coffee machine up to about 500ml.Open the coffee machine descaler product (Liquid water descaling kit). You can find this product in supermarkets and hardware stores. If you can't find any, then you can descale Dolce Gusto with vinegar, but we don't recommend this for automatic coffee machines. Read how can I clean my coffee make with vinegar. Pour the liquid contents of the Dolce Gusto descaling product into the tank with water. Make sure to follow the instructions on the packaging. Replace the tank onto the machine and turn it on.Place a container under the coffee spout, ideally something that you can easily discard or clean afterwards, as the descaler product can be toxic.Press the coffee machine button. Activate the water outlet as if you were going to whip up a coffee, emptying the tank and cleaning the Dolce Gusto machine. It is normal that the water appears cloudy at first. Repeat the process as many times as is necessary, emptying all of the liquid in the coffee machine.Then, fill the tank with clean water. Immediately refill the tank with clean fresh water to rinse out the Dolce Gusto descaling product properly. Once the water runs completely clear in color, your Dolce Gusto coffee machine has officially been descaled and cleaned properly, you can then use it as your normally would.Descaling Dolce Gusto: option 2Fill the tank with water, descaling solution or vinegar.Make sure the pod is empty and arm is lowered.Press and hold down on the on/off button until it blinks.Additionally, if you don't have descaling solution or vinegar, you can also opt for citric acid to descale your coffee machine. So, you don't have any descaler at home and are looking for an alternative descaler. Here are your two best options:Citric acidWhen using citric acid as a descaler we recommend using 1 part acid to 20 part water. VinegarWhen using vinegar to descale a coffee machine, we recommend using a 50/50 ratio. With both of the above methods, we recommend running water cycles 4-5 times to make sure all leftover taste and smell is well removed. Have you noticed that your red light is flashing on your Dolce Gusto machine and are not sure why? In this case, after descaling it and cleaning it, the first thing you should do is turn it off and then on again (by pushing on/off button). If this doesn't work, unplug it from the socket and then plug it back in. Your kitchen may not be complete without a decent coffee machine - whether your drink of choice is a latte, espresso or even if you favour hot chocolate, there's no shortage of sleek and stylish coffee maker options for your kitchen. But if you do splash out on a coffee machine, that also means you'll have to undertake the boring but necessary chore of descaling it. There are all manner of options available to keep your machine free of limescale, and delivering high quality drinks. But whether you have a Dolce Gusto, a Nespresso or something else entirely, just how do you descale your coffee machine? Why do you need to descale your coffee machine? You should descale your coffee machine on a regular basis to prevent the build-up of limescale inside the machine itself. This can affect the taste of your coffee - and if left unchecked, could also potentially lead to blockages and leaks in the machine. How often should you descale your coffee machine? That largely depends on whether you live in a hard water area - as limescale can form more easily in hard water areas, where the minerals in the water can group together and solidify. Many coffee machines will give you an indication of when it's time to descale the device - for example lights on Nespresso and Dolce Gusto machines will turn orange if the machine needs descaling. However you should also look out for other signs that the machine may need a clean, such as leaking or dripping water, reduced water flow or water stopping entirely, the water not heating up properly, or strange noises coming from your coffee maker. If you experience any of those, it could be time to get the descaling kit out. How do you descale a coffee machine? If you have a machine which uses coffee pods - such as a Nespresso, Tassimo or Dolce Gusto - the process for descaling it is pretty much the same. For Dolce Gusto and Nespresso machines, you should fill the tank with water, adding descaling solution into the tank. Then place a large glass or container under the coffee outlet. Here's what you do next: Dolce Gusto For Dolce Gusto machines, press the on/off button for around five seconds until it flashes green and orange, to show that it is in descaling mode. You should then run half of the water and descaling solution through the coffee machine into the container, pressing the hot button on your machine. Wait two minutes and then repeat the process until the tank is empty. Discard the water, clean the tank, refill it with fresh water and rinse the machine. Once again, you should place an empty container underneath the coffee outlet, and set the machine to hot, running through the water until the tank is half empty. Then switch to the cold setting for the remaining water. Nespresso As with Dolce Gusto, for Nespresso you should fill the tank with water and descaling solution place a container under the coffee outlet. You then should set it to descaling mode, which varies according to the type of machine you have - you can check here how to set your machine. The procedure is then similar - run the water and descaling solution through the machine into the container, before cleaning the tank, filling with water and rinsing the machine through once again. Tassimo Although the process is similar for Tassimo coffee machines, it varies slightly from the others. Tassimo recommends that you fill the water tank and add two descaling tablets. Then take the Service T Disc (yellow disc) from the machine and place it with the barcode face down in the brew head (where you would normally place your coffee pod). Then push and hold the button for about five seconds to start the descaling programme, run the water through the machine and rinse as before. Can you use lemon juice or vinegar to descale your coffee machine? If you don't have any descaling solution to hand or you would prefer a more natural solution, you can also make a solution using lemon juice or citric acid, or white vinegar simply add to the water tank and rinse through in the same way as you would with descaling solution. If you're using citric acid you should add about one part to 20 parts water, with a more even 50/50 split if using lemon juice or vinegar - and run the solution through the coffee machine in the same way. However a note of caution: some advise against using vinegar as the strong flavour can affect the taste of your coffee, once it's been inside your machine. Some manufacturers, such as Nespresso, also specifically advise on their website against using vinegar, as it can cause damage to the machine. So yes, home made solutions can work, but if in doubt, you should always stick to an actual descaling solution.
