Loom gauge is the distance the yarn travels from one peg to another which makes up 1 stitch. The measurement from the center of one peg to the next is called C2C Peg Spacing (Center to Center). Some looms with peg and pin systems do not measure C2C. Also, the diameter of a peg can change the gauge. The loom gauge categories actually are determined by manufacturer(s) test knitting several swatches (samples) in appropriate yarn to see which category that loom should fall under. The categories actually line up with a range of needle sizes. Keep this page handy as well when converting needle patterns. *Keep in mind not all companies note the gauge but whatever size they make will fall into these categories. EFG = Extra Fine Gauge (3/16") = Equiv. Needle 1-3 (2.25 mm - 3.5 mm) FG = Fine Gauge (1/4") = Equiv. Needle 3-6 (3.5 mm - 4.5 mm) FG = Fine Gauge (3/16") = Equiv. Needle 3-6 mm) SG = Small Gauge (5/16", 3/8", 7/16") = Equiv. Needle 6-8 (3.75 mm - 5 mm) RG = Regular Gauge (1/2", 9/16") = Equiv. Needle 8-10 (5 mm - 6 mm) LG = Extra Large Gauge (3/4", 13/16", 7/8", 15/16") = Equiv. Needle 13-15 (9 mm - 10 mm) JUMBO* = EXL+ to JUMBO (+/-1 1/2") = Equiv. Needle 19-50 (12.75 mm - 25 mm) *Not official name; works with Jumbo #7 U.S. yarn weight. Most manufacturers determine their gauge/set of their knitting loom product and will list it with the Loom Gauge abbreviation and/or the C2C fraction. If it is not listed you can usually measure this for yourself or check our chart. There are a few exceptions though. Different looms will have pegs of various diameters or even peg and pin systems (Kiss Looms) that make it hard to measure and also can change the gauge from one peg to the next. Other contributing parts to determine the gauge of knitting are: Yarn weight, stitch, tension, your mood and even the type of peg material. Your knitting gauge can be different than a fellow knitter due to these even on the same loom! Whether on a loom that is straight, round, oval, has one rake or two (also called the upper and lower of a long loom or a knitting board), your loom gauge will be measured from C2C. However if you have a double rake (double sided) loom like a long loom or a knitting board), your loom gauge will be measured from C2C. knitting board, you can also measure a second gauge for double knitting. Kiss Looms are unique in that the peg spacing can adjust the gauge of the loom (distance from one peg to the next) just by adding the thickness of a washer. This term is used to explain HOW to measure. In loom patterns it may be written as a fraction, abbreviation or a specific loom may be called out. Measurements for Loom Gauge Be sure to take notes on that measurement and how you got it there and use a hard ruler or a digital caliper for accuracy. Notice the columns with the Needle Equivalent listed and stitches per inch. Also included are recommended yarn weights for the needles and looms "C2C" or "Gauge" listed. These appear in a range of needles & weights as your loom can handle different stitches per inch with a change in yarn, stitch pattern, and tension (how tight or loose you tend to knit). Please note that the US and UK/AU systems are noted. For stitches in a 10 cm swatch. (2.54cm = 10 cm swatch.) 1 inch). Keep in mind that stitches per inch listed are taken from averages and are not set in stone. The rows per inch are not listed on this chart. Loom Comparison Examples •Loom A & B are listed as SG and 3/8". They can both be measured from the center of the peg groove to the center of the next peg groove. However, Loom B's peg is just a little bit larger in diameter than Loom A. Here the stitches per inch could be slightly less on Loom B compared to a swatch from Loom A with the same yarn and type of stitch pattern. •Loom C is a Kiss loom with a peg in front and a pin behind on a thinner pin board; this loom is listed as an SG but it is difficult to measure. Here the yarn travels in front of the peg and then behind the pin that is behind and offset from the peg. The distance between the peg and pin can get larger if washers are added between the front larger board to change the overall gauge. Knitting a swatch (see Why Swatch) is the best way to confirm overall knit gauge. Again, other contributing parts to determine the gauge of knitting are: Yarn weight, stitch, tension and your mood. Size adjustable looms allow the knitter to slide or move part of the frame to get the desired peg count. The iconic 'loom', which simply refers to the crafty contraption used to weave together yarn (or thread) to produce fabric, has widespread origins from Europe in the Middle Ages to the intricate craftwork of the Americas. Today, loom knitting remains a celebrated technique that can be used to create anything from gorgeous wall hangings, hats, scarfs, afghans and beyond! Loom knitting is especially brilliant for those who experience sore hands, such as those with arthritis or carpal tunnel syndrome. It's also a wonderful alternative for those who simply favor a needleless approach to their projects, not to mention that the technique is incredibly fast so you can whip up marvellous creations in record time. With a variety of knitting looms and a broad spectrum of techniques available, loom knitting provides the basis to create diverse and showstopping projects. But first, let's talk looms. There are many varieties of loom available depending of the project such as blankets, circular looms are excellent for flat panel projects such as blankets. types of loom you are likely to encounter on your loom knitting adventure! Rake looms, also known as long looms, are characterized by a single row of pegs, generally used to create flat panel projects such as afghans and scarves from single knitting. When two rakes are set aside one another you then have what as known as a knitting board. Some rake looms on the market may include two rows with an additional peg on either end of the loom allowing you to work in the round if you so wish. Just like regular knitting, fabric produced from a simple rake loom will have a knit side and purl side. together your pins the finer your knitted fabric! Round knitting looms refer to a loom where there is no stopping point, unlike its cousin the rake. A round knitting loom is any device where you can continuously weave, this might appear in a menagerie of wonderful shapes and sizes, including circular, oval, square, triangular and even heart-shaped looms. Round loom knitting projects are often (but not exclusively) tubular shaped because of ability to continuously knit in the round, which means if you're looking to make socks, sleeves or cowls, or anything that might have a tube or circle shape - round looms are a must! S-loom, or the serenity loom, has an 'infinity' figure of eight structure, and is the perfect knitting loom for crafting large panels of fabric which can be sewn together to create dreamy afghans and blankets. Sock looms include an adjustable gauge so you can easily create increases and decreases to knit the perfect size for your whole family, whether you're creating grown up socks or baby booties. Loom weaving is a fiber craft that is distinctive from loom knitting. The weaving loom, unlike knitting loom, doesn't have pegs and instead facilitates a series of warped threads, that you can use as a framework to weave in your yarn. Anything is possible with a loom and a little know-how! It's important to bear in mind often loom knitting stitches have different names to those created by needles. Knitting looms work best for projects like scarves, round (or circular) looms are best for hats, socks or anything that has a tube structure. Let's get down to basics. The anatomy of a loom is made up of three essential components; base, pegs and gauge. The base is the frame at the bottom of your loom which might be a long or round available in lots of sizes. called pins. The gauge is the distance between each peg (or pin), the wider the gauge. Easy-peasy! The size of your loom. Many fledgling loom knitters refer to the size of the loom as the number of pegs, but this is a massive no-no! As a beginner it's important to remember that it's actually the size of the base that determines the size of your project, not necessarily the number of pegs and the gauge influence the tension of your stitches, or how tightly knit together your stitches are. More pegs does not necessarily mean a bigger size. Saying that, there is one exception and that is the style of stitch. If you use a loose stitch such as an Ewrap stitch then your loom. When it comes to the number of rows and pegs on your loom knitting project, it's important to remember that these are not interchangeable. The peg count determines the circumference or width of your project, and the number of rows is how many times you repeat this. If you are making a tubular project such as socks or a hat on a round loom, then the rows will only add to the length of the tube, but not give anymore give around the foot or head. In addition to your loom and yarn you will also need a hook to catch and pull your loops of yarn over to create the knitting with needles, loom knitting includes a whole encyclopedia of stitches, there are two fundamental methods of knitting on a loom: single and double knitting. Single-knitting is when you knit stitches on pegs next to one another, creating a fabric which will have a 'right' and 'wrong' side. The knit stitch is achieved by using your hook to pull at the yarn looped around your peg, to create a new loop. By lifting the old loop up and over, you replace with the new loop on your peg to create a new knit stitch. And that's it! This is the primal stitch is a close cousin of knit stitch, except it's tighter more compact. Stretch the working yarn across the top loop of the peg and simply use your hook to lift the bottom loop over and off your peg, securing the working yarn in place by making it a new loop. Purl stitch, meaning that the backside of your fabric will be knit material the frontside will be purl. Both knit and purl stitches are fantastic starting points to launch you into a world of glorious textures and designs as you learn to loom knit. Double-knitting is when you knit across two rails, if you are using a long loom, so you have a front and a back peg, meaning you get the same texture on both sides of your fabric. In loom knitting this might be referred to as a flat (stockinette) stitch, and when knitting with needles this is known as the basic knit stitch (k). Just like the gorgeous basic fabric produced when knitting with needles, the no wrap stitch is a staple for the avid loom knitter and can be used on a long loom or round one. And that's a wrap! Better known as the twisted stockinette stitch when knitting with needles (tw St st), the ewrap works a treat on both long and round looms. Perfect for gloves and garments with the iconic ribbed effect, the single ribbed stitch sees ewrap stitches alternate with purl stitches on each row creating glorious ridges of yarn.
