Many students struggle with counting from 1 to 100 due to the complexity of numbers 60-99. However, there are five useful tips to learn them faster. Firstly, you can memorize 1-10 by counting in either even or odd numbers separately. Another trick is to count backwards from ten to zero. When it comes to teens (15-19), a simple trick is to repeat "You can say quinze seize" (the C and S sounds repeat). Numbers above 10 end in the -z sound, such as onze (eleven), douze (twelve) and treize (thirteen). You can remember these numbers by thinking of them as "teenz". The numbers 20-59 are relatively straightforward. To say twenty, simply say vingt (pronounced ve, the same pronunciation as the word for wine, vin!). For twenty-one, add "et un" or and one. This pattern works for all the numbers through 59. Some students may struggle to distinguish teens from higher numbers. A helpful tip is to think of a phrase like "I have a lot of aunties" (for 30) or "I have forty aunties" (for 40). The numbers 60-79 can be challenging, but there are some key tips to help you. To count from 60-69, simply say soixante and then follow the pattern for 20-59. When counting beyond 70, remember that seventy is soixante-dix (sixty ten), while seventy-one is soixante et onze (sixty and eleven). One final tip is to practice saying "soixante" quickly before adding the corresponding teen number. This will help you avoid stumbling when counting. The numbers 80-99 become more complicated due to the need to say quatre-vingts for eighty and four twenties for each subsequent number. However, by following a similar pattern, you can master these numbers as well. Lastly, note that Switzerland and Belgium have their own specific words for seventy, eighty, and ninety: Septante (70) and huitante (80) and nonante (90).
