Students employ spatial concepts and landscape analyses to analyze human social organization and its environmental consequences while also learning about the methods and tools geographers use in their science and practice. section consists of 60 multiple choice questions and the second section consists of 3 free-response questions, the first with no stimulus, the second with two stimulus, and the third with two stimulus. Student's must interpret and include the stimulus if included with the question in their answers to receive full points. Common stimuli examples are data images, or maps.[2] The sections are 60 and 75 minutes long, respectively. It is not necessary to answer the free-response questions in essay form; instead, points are awarded on certain keywords, examples, and other vital aspects. As of May 2025 the AP Human Geography Exam will be online.[3] The curriculum consists of informational book-related homework, which often requires students to strive to learn information independently.
