CNMs, who may have their own private practices, can write prescriptions and order tests, while CRNAs often work in hospitals or clinics with physician supervision. The median annual wage for CRNAs is \$203,090, which is higher than that of CNMs (\$120,880). To become a CNM or CRNA, one must have a master's degree and RN experience, as well as pass an exam. Clinical hours are also required, including 2,000 hours of anesthesia administration experience. CRNAs provide pain management and some emergency services in addition to administering anesthesia. Many positions need certification through an exam and/or state licensure. Nursing assistants typically require a training program but no degree, while licensed practical nurses complete a one-year non-degree program and pass the NCLEX-PN exam. Registered nurses must have an associate or bachelor's degree in nursing, with a clinical component, and pass the NCLEX-RN to become certified.
